

First Grade Explores the Symbols of Our Nation

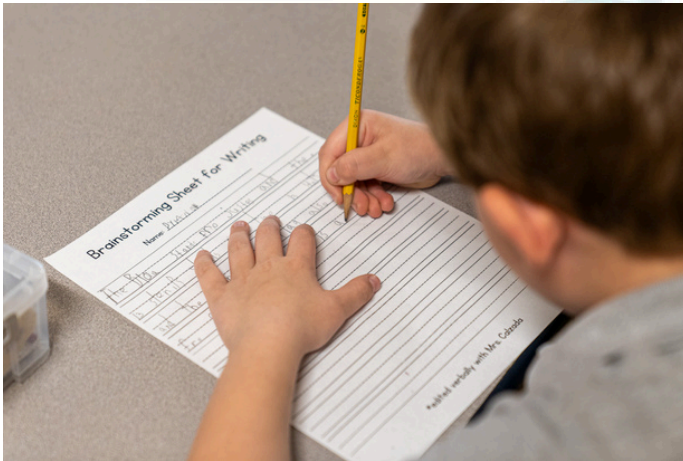

These discussions encouraged critical thinking and helped students grasp the significance behind each emblem—not just what it is, but how and why it represents America.

Their curiosity sparked meaningful conversations and personal reflections on what it means to be part of a democratic nation.
