
LEONIS ADOBE FIELDTRIP: CRITICAL THINKING WRITING ASSIGNMENT

in 2nd Grade

This week, our second-grade students took their writing skills to the next level by crafting reviews of their recent trip to the Leon Adobe Museum. Through this activity, the students were able to develop multiple critical thinking skills. They began with *Remembering* by recalling key moments from the trip. Then, they *understood* their experiences by adding descriptive details. As they moved into *Applying* their knowledge, students structured their reviews with a clear beginning, middle, and end. Lastly, they *evaluated* their trip by providing a thoughtful rating and *created* a well-organized review that reflected their personalities.

In addition to academic growth, this project reinforced important biblical values. Students demonstrated gratitude by reflecting on what they had learned and experienced, and they showed integrity in giving honest feedback about the museum. As they worked through the process of writing, they also exhibited patience and perseverance in revising their drafts and adding details.
