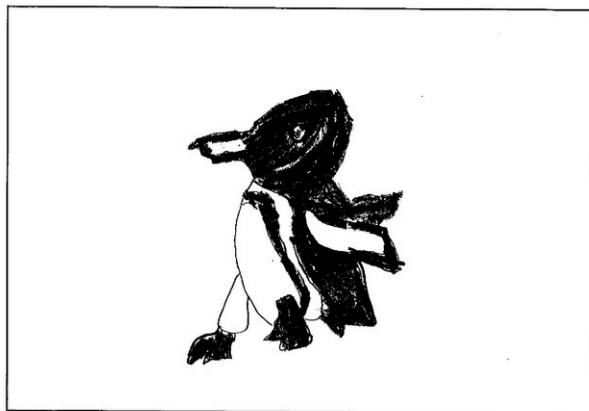


# KINDERGARTEN RESEARCHERS

# KINDERGARTEN RESEARCHERS

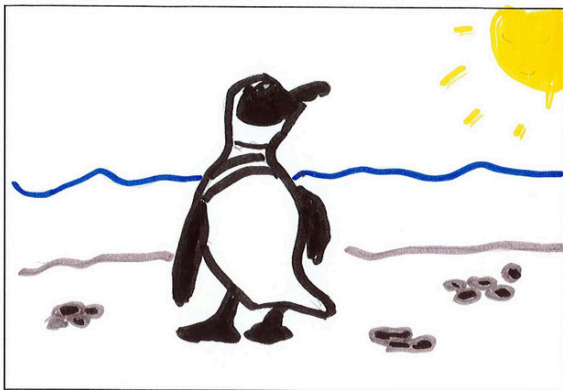

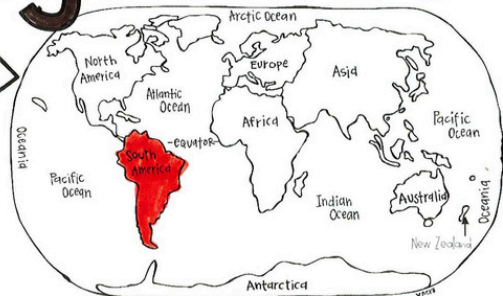

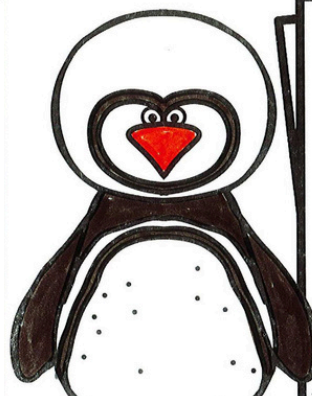
Where they live
