## **EMPATHY UNVEILED: JOURNEYS OF UNDERSTANDING AND ACTION**

Last week, the 7th and 8th graders embarked on transformative field trips that broadened their perspectives and deepened their empathy for others. The 7th graders visited the Children's Hunger Fund and Poverty Encounter, where they delved into a captivating interactive exhibit. Here, they delved into Anne Frank's profound story and gained a deeper understanding of the Holocaust's impact. The museum's Social Lab provided an interactive platform for them to examine social issues in America, both past and present. Through exhibits and discussions on discrimination, prejudice, and human resilience, the students developed empathy and a passion for social justice and historical awareness.
