

“TO KILL A MOCKINGBIRD” ANALYSIS

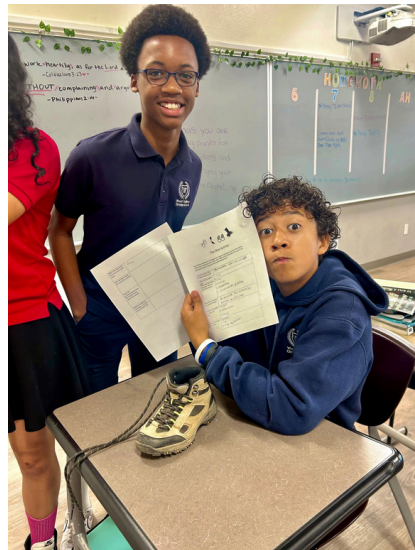
